# **Staffing**

We consider Religious Education to be an integral part of our school ethos and school community. Each class group has three R.E. periods per week.

Subject departments, including a Religious Education department exist in the school and a formal meeting takes place in September at which the syllabus provision is planned. Schedules of work for each year group are agreed on. The first year students follow the DES Syllabus but will not be sitting the state exam. The 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> year Junior Cycle students follow the DES Syllabus for the state examinations. The Senior Cycle students follow the non-exam DES Syllabus. The main text book is Seek and Find, Veritas. Fr. Joy is the school Chaplain. He provides the opportunities for the school community to have sacramental experiences through:

- Junior and Senior opening school year masses
- ➤ Advent / Lent prayer services
- ➤ Lenten Ashes
- Parish Easter Liturgy
- Graduation Mass for sixth years
- Parish Advent Mass
- Weekly Lenten masses for students and staff

### **Curriculum and Resources**

The school is linked to the Diocesan Office, and the Diocesan Advisor Mr. Luke O' Connor provides Religious Education teachers with resources, DES Syllabus advice. The ERST charter and head office provide guidance in our programme.

Each class group in the school studies Religious Education for three periods per week. School liturgical celebrations are evaluated by the RE department.

The school has provided each teacher with a set of text books. The NUA program and prayer room is also available. A religion folder has been created for sharing and storing resources on the staff drive.

### Junior Cycle Programme

The first year students follow the DES Syllabus but will not be sitting the state exam.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> year Junior Cycle students follow the DES Syllabus for the state examinations.

The text book used is The Question of Faith.

### Senior Cycle Programme

The Senior Cycle Religious Education Programme is a core subject at 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> year, but is not an examination subject.

Teachers in Senior RE choose the appropriate time and content required to explore each of these areas, taking into account the needs of the students. This also determines whether the topic is covered in fifth or sixth year.

The text book used is Seek and Find Katherina Broderick, Elaine Costello and Brendan O' Regan Transition Year students are following a program formulated by the R.E. Dept.

Relationship, Sexuality Education is taught through Religious Education class. The teacher takes into consideration the R.S.E programme content, the R.S.E policy and the Catholic ethos of the school.

### Content and Assessment Techniques

The Religion Dept. is committed the whole school approach and will endeavour to implement the Literacy and Numeracy, Group Work and AFL Targets.

# **Staff Support and Development**

The School management provides support for the delivery of the RE curriculum in the following ways:

- > ERST, The Board of Management, The Diocesan Advisor, School Chaplain and priests in the parish.
- > RE teachers are allowed to attend in-service.
- > Cover is organised for teachers involved in parish liturgy.
- Staff are invited to be involved in school services and masses.
- Funding is provided for Senior RE resources.

### Faith Formation and the Liturgical Year

The liturgical seasons are marked in the school in the following ways:

- ➤ Advent Wreath in the sacred space
- > Parish Advent Mass.
- ➤ Christmas Crib, tree, class prayer service, reconciliation service.
- ➤ Lent ashes offered to the students, weekly Lenten mass offered to staff and students, reconciliation.
- Easter students are brought to St. Joseph's to do the Stations of the Cross.

### Christian Unity Week and Catholic Schools Week

Christian Unity Week and Catholic Schools Week are celebrated in January through our sacred space, poster competitions and reflections

#### **Graduation Mass**

The sixth year graduation mass takes place in May and involves students, their parents and staff.

#### Parish Involvement.

Our annual parish Advent Mass and St. Patrick's Day Mass takes place in the Cathedral. Students participate in the Easter ceremonies in the cathedral.
